

Bible Study: How the Scriptures Have Been Changed

1. The Father's Name Was Replaced

Originally, the Creator's name Yahuah appeared nearly 7,000 times in the Hebrew scriptures. Most modern Bibles replaced it with 'LORD' or 'GOD' in capital letters. This obscures the personal, covenant name of the Most High.

- Exodus 3:15 - 'This is my name forever...'

- Psalm 68:4 - '...his name is YAH...'

2. Yahusha's Name Was Changed to Jesus

The Messiah's Hebrew name is Yahusha, which means 'Yahuah is Salvation'. The name 'Jesus' came much later, evolving from the Greek 'Iesous'. This change diluted the connection between the Son and the Father.

- John 5:43 - 'I am come in my Father's name...'

- Acts 4:12 - 'There is no other name under heaven...'

3. The Sabbath Was Changed From Saturday to Sunday

The 7th-day Sabbath (Saturday) was changed by Roman authority to Sunday worship. This shift was formalized by Constantine in the 4th century to unite pagan sun worship with Christianity.

- Exodus 20:8-11 - The 4th commandment

- Daniel 7:25 - 'He shall think to change times and laws'

4. Torah (Law) Was Declared Abolished

Many Christian doctrines today teach that the Law (Torah) was done away with, despite Yahusha's clear statement that He did not come to abolish the Law.

- Matthew 5:17-19 - 'Not one jot or tittle shall pass...'
- Romans 3:31 - 'Do we make void the law? God forbid...'

5. Scriptures Were Translated With Bias

Many translations were influenced by doctrinal bias and cultural pressure. Words like 'church', 'cross', 'Easter', and others were added or mistranslated.

- Acts 12:4 - 'Easter' in KJV is a mistranslation of 'Passover'
- 2 Timothy 4:3 - 'For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine...'
